### Admissions

ERHS is a small, screened public high school in Manhattan. Students are accepted based on academic history, attendance, and New York State standardized exams. The Class of 2022 is comprised of 131 students from approximately 5,400 applicants.

### School Statistics and Demographics

- Current enrollment: 529
- Students represent all five boroughs of New York City. Our diverse student population come from homes where over 24 different languages/dialects are spoken.
- Approximately 18% of students are eligible for free lunch as part of the National School Lunch Program.
- Class of 2018: 88% enroll in 4-year colleges and universities in the U.S.; 5% pursue higher education abroad; 4% enroll in 2-year colleges.
  - 99.3% graduation rate (Class of 2017)
  - 96% average daily attendance rate

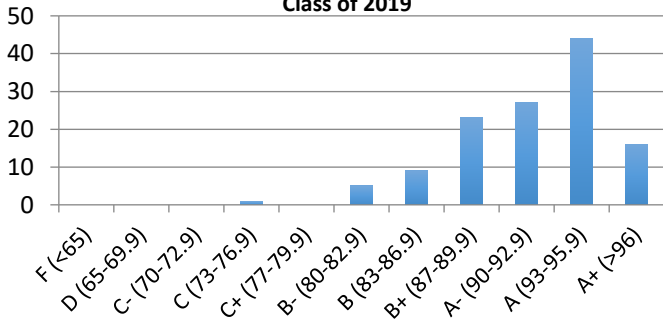
### Class of 2019

### Grading Policy

- **ERHS does not rank students.**
- Grades are awarded on the traditional 100-point scale. Advisory, PE, labs and teaching assistantships are on the P/D/F scale.
- As an **annualized school**, the final grade is given by the teacher at the end of the school year. Unweighted annual course grades are listed on the transcript.
- In the calculation of the **cumulative GPA** AP courses and College English are weighted by a factor of 1.05.
- Transfer credits from non-NYC public high schools are not included in the cumulative average.

Cumulative Average Distribution for the Class of 2019

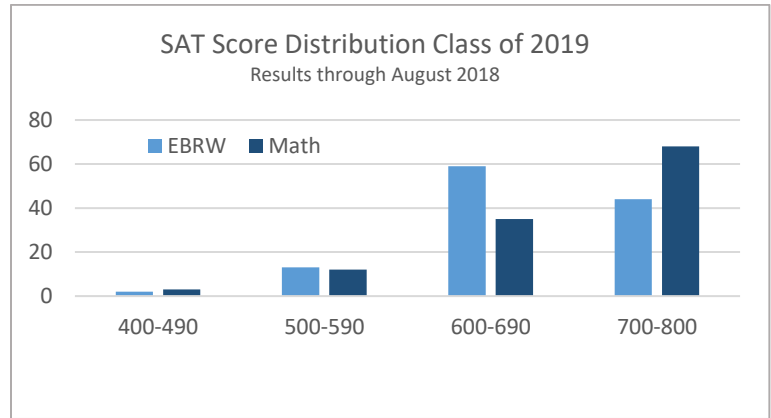


### Extra-Curricular Activities

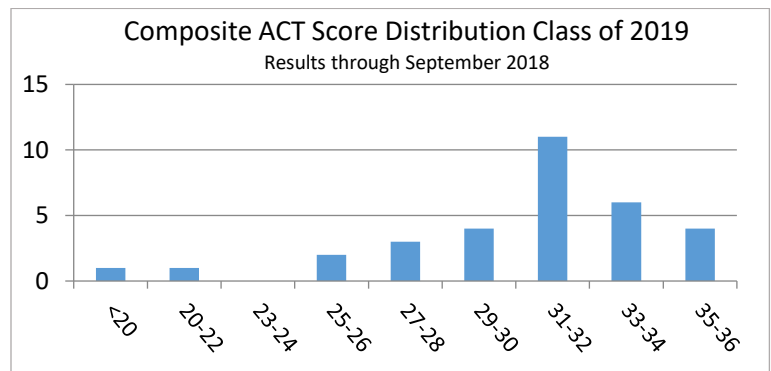
### SAT Score Middle 50%: 1300-1470 Mean: 1365

### Weighted Courses

- Juniors and seniors may register for an Advanced Placement course if approved via a review of overall and subject specific GPA, attendance, and faculty recommendation. All students are enrolled in AP World History in 10<sup>th</sup> grade and AP US History in 11<sup>th</sup> grade.
- **The majority of students are capped at taking 2 AP courses per academic year. Approximately 32% of the Class of 2019 are approved for 3 weighted courses this year.**
- AP courses offered in 2018-2019: Art History, Biology, Calculus BC, Chemistry, Comparative Government and Politics, Computer Science Principles, English Language and Composition, English Literature and Composition, Macroeconomics, Physics C: Mechanics, Spanish Literature, Statistics, United States History, and World History.
- College English is offered as a dual enrollment senior year English course in partnership with St. John's University (NY). Athletics

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## ELEANOR ROOSEVELT RECENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND ACCOLADES

- In the past five years, alumni have been accepted for admission at 400 colleges and universities, both inside and outside of the United States. A complete list of schools where alumni have been admitted can be found on the Eleanor Roosevelt High School website.
- In 2018, *US News and World Report* ranked Eleanor Roosevelt High School 109th in the nation, 19th in New York State, and 110<sup>th</sup> in STEM High Schools.
- Designated each year as a 'Blue Star' school in Financial Literacy by WISE.
- Seniors mentor freshmen and sophomores in Advisory twice a week through a student-led peer leadership program called ElRo Sibbs.
- Approximately 88% of the Class of 2017 earned an Advanced Regents Diploma.
- Our faculty and staff include: two fellows of the Math for America Corps; seven fellows of the Academy for Teachers; a National Science Foundation EFRI-REM researcher and mentor; Teen Ink magazine's Educator of the Year; a Certified Google Trainer; a WISE Gold Star Teacher; two Fund for Teaching Fellows; a Joseph S. Murphy Diversity in Labor Scholar; a NYSACAC High School Delegate; a Sloan Award winner for Excellence in Teaching Science and Math; an Our Town Thanks You award winner; a Carnegie Hall Music Educator workshop participant; a National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Institute participant; a Global Language Project participant, two National Historical Publications and Records Commission grant winners, and a teacher selected as Finalist for Big Apple Award.
